New Proposed HIPAA Security Rules Affect All Electronic Data

New proposed rules just issued by HCFA under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) provide for penalties of \$50,000/1 year in jail for unintentional leaks of patient information, \$100,000/5 years in jail for release of patient data under false pretenses, and \$250,000/10 years in jail for misappropriating and selling patient medical data. The rules would require, among other things:

If you transmit patient data over an open network such as the 'Net, you **must** encrypt it.

If you use an electronic signature, you must use digital signature technology.

If you have individual electronic patient data, you must audit your system records regularly for security breaches and check for viruses. These rules could be finalized soon. The public comment period was to end Oct. 13. Final rules will be hammered out and published in the Federal Register—possibly as early

as the end of this year. Then, 60 days after publication, they would go into effect. But that doesn't mean instant compliance. Most affected entities would get 24 months to comply. Health plans with fewer than 50 members get 36 months. So you have until early 2001 to get ready.

The proposed rules are sweeping. Other security rules have applied only to transmissions of patient data. These security standards apply if you so much as store any "electronic health information that relates to an individual." In HCFA's words:

"The security standard is applicable to all health care information electronically maintained or used in an electronic transmission, regardless of format (standard transaction or a proprietary format); no distinction is made between internal corporate entity communication or communication external to the corporate entity."

Which Rule is Which? Here's The Scorecard And Where To Get Full Details

Under HIPAA, HCFA has now issued several proposed sets of rules and standards, and more are coming. One of these proposed regs, and a future one, deal with security. In addition, HCFA plans to issue a new Internet security policy, which is not specifically either a HIPAA standard or a regulation. The rules, standards and policies affecting healthcare IS are:

1. **National provider identifier:** a uniform national system of identifiers for health care providers. Full details are in **IHC Special Report #8601** (which also includes #2 below), \$67. This 254-page report includes complete texts of the HCFA proposed rules and explanations.

2. **EDI transactions:** a set of standards for 10 types of healthcare electronic data interchange (EDI) transactions. **Get IHC Report #8601**, which also includes item #1 above.

3. **National patient identifier:** our summary and HCFA's White Paper on the requirement for a uniform way of identifying all health care patients. **Report #8602**, \$57.

4. **National employer ID:** details on HCFA's proposal for meeting the HIPAA requirement for a national employer identifier, **Report #8603**, \$47.

5. **Internet security policy:** new draft policy issued 9/98. **Report #8305**, \$44).

6. **A national health information security policy.** Including but not only electronic data, it will cover all individually identifiable patient data. If Congress doesn't pass a law on patient information disclosure by August, 1999, the Secretary of Health has until February, 2000 to adopt regulations.

7. **The proposed electronic data security rule** affects all electronic patient data. To get the full formatted text of the HCFA proposals with a table of contents and a longer version of this report, order **Report #8604**, \$67.
